We recommend ordering the book online at amazon.com. You can also find or order the book from Books on Main in Hopkinsville or Books A Million in Clarksville, Tennessee.

7th – 12th grade 2018 Required Summer Reading Book Report Instructions

Directions: Please read and follow all directions carefully.

Use the following guidelines to write your summer reading report. The report will be due on the first day of school – Thursday, August 9, 2018. All book reports will be turned in on this date. Any student not turning in a report on August 9 will receive a zero.

All reports must be typed in the following format:

- · Double spaced
- · 1 inch margins
- · 12 point Times New Roman typeface

The report should be written in standard paragraph format. The tone is formal. **DO NOT use abbreviations**, slang, texting language, etc.

Every report must be a minimum of 500 words.

Before Reading: Answer the following questions:

Author: Who is the author? Have you read any other works by this author?

Genre: What type of book is this: fiction, non-fiction, biography, science fiction, etc.?

Title: What does the title do for you? Does it spark your interest? Does it fit well with the text of the book?

Book Cover: What does the book jacket or cover say? Is it accurate? Were you excited to read this book based on the jacket

or cover?

As You Read: Answer the following questions. (It would be very helpful to take notes as you read and gather the following information.)

While reading *fiction*, keep track of the major characters. You can also do the same with biographies.

When reading non-fiction, also look for the main ideas and be ready to discuss them in your report.

Characters: Who are the main characters? What happens to them? Did you like them? Were there good and bad charac-

ters? Describe them and their differences.

Main Ideas: What is the main idea of the book? What happens? What did you learn that you did not know before? Provide

details.

Quotes: What parts of the book did you like the best? Are there parts that you could quote to make your report more

enjoyable?

When Ready to Write:

The summer reading report needs to be written in standard paragraph format. Do not simply list the information requested. Write the paper as if you are telling a friend about the book you have read. All reports must be a minimum of 500 words. Include the following information:

In the first paragraph, you need to include, at a minimum, the title of the book, the author, and the genre. (Do not list. Write in complete sentences.)

In the following paragraphs, you will need to summarize *what you have learned* from the book. Do not just provide a summary of the book. Be sure to include:

- · How was the title of the book applied to the work? Does it adequately capture the message of the text? Is it interesting? Uninteresting?
- · Describe the elements you liked, or did not like, in the book.
- · Tell what you would have changed or what you would keep the same and why.
- · Which principle characters did you like the best and why? Which characters did you not like and why? How do they affect the story? Do you empathize with them?
- · What was the theme of the book? Was it easy to determine? Why do you think the writer wrote this book? What message was he or she trying to communicate?
- · Did the book appeal to you in any emotional or logical way?
- · Would you recommend this book to others? Describe why or why not.

Revising/Preparing Final Copy:

- · Double check the spelling of the author's name, characters' names, and title of the book.
- · Carefully check punctuation and grammar.
- · Make sure you provide enough summary and/or evaluation of the book so your instructor can tell you read the book (and not just Sparknotes)!
- · Consider adding some interesting quotes from the book.

WARNING: All reports can be electronically checked for plagiarism. Please be sure that your report is your own original work. **DO NOT cut and paste information from any internet source.** Any plagiarism detected will be punished with a zero on the report and a full demerit.

Please refer to the attached grading rubric to see how the reports will be graded.

Remember: All reports are due on the first day of school, Thursday, August 9, 2018.
